## Mayor, town staff open up gates to Berlin Falls park

(May 19, 2016) Berlin offered a brief glimpse into its plans for the former Tyson's Chicken plant on Old Ocean City Boulevard on Monday, as the mayor, several councilmembers and town staff gathered for a sort of informal ribbon cutting.

"We are so fortunate to get to this point," Mayor Gee Williams said, calling the gathering a "preview of the potential and possibilities of the 62-acre tract."

"Now, under town ownership, we are informally calling it 'Berlin Falls Park.' If somebody wants to give us several million dollars, we will reconsider changing the name," Williams said, drawing a laugh from the audience.

Since the town bought the property in February, the public works department has taken the lead in the effort to transform the former industrial site into a public park, Williams said.

"Calling the work a cleanup is a really an understatement," he said. "In addition to many years of accumulated debris, they have gotten rid of or safely secured obstacles that could have posed threats or injury to park visitors. Berlin Public Works also has made the



entire property safe for public use by securing all the buildings [and] adding bright yellow paint to all the safety features, such as railings and balusters."

Department workers also expanded the parking area, posted signs, removed several truckloads of overgrowth and mowed the grass "for days and days and days," Williams said.

The mayor credited Town Administrator Laura Allen with coordinating the effort, as well as Public Works Director Jane Kreiter, Managing Director Jeff Fleetwood, Public Works Supervisor Wendell Purnell and Administrative Services Director Mary Bohlen.

He also highlighted Assistant Superintendent of Public Works Dave Wheaton, whom Williams nicknamed "get 'er done Dave."

"Everyone has done such an impressive job – everyone – under such tight time constraints and with less-than-cooperative weather this spring," Williams said. "It was a tight deadline and the weather made it downright silly, but you did it."

"Please do not let anyone diminish in any way all that you have done," he continued. "Because of the potential Berlin Falls park has for all citizens and

## OPA and BEACON terminate contract

(May 19, 2016) The OPA and Salisbury University group BEACON have terminated a contract between the two for services that involved the development of a new comprehensive plan.

In 2015, the OPA board voted 5-1 to hire the Business, Economic, and Community Outreach Network for that purpose, at a cost of \$33,000.

BEACON Director Dr. Memo Diriker at the time said a grant would cover half that cost. The balance was to be split into two payments of \$8,250.

Diriker was apparently paid \$8,250 before the termination, which happened during a closed meeting two weeks ago, and was approved by a unanimous vote of the directors.

The relationship between SU and BEACON seemed to sour following a meeting in March of this year, when, possibly because of scheduling confusion, Diriker did not show up. Members of the Pines Comprehensive Planning Committee who then tried to run the meeting – essentially providing an update on their work on the survey – seemed ill prepared to do so.

One committee member later termed that meeting "an unmitigated disaster."

Details on the termination are few, in part because OPA Board President Pat Renaud said the agreement included a clause "not to speak about each other at all."

"That was a stipulation that we had to agree to that they would not disparage us and we would not disparage them," he said. "Other talkative members of our directors may not find that to be true, but it is true and that's what we agreed to. We all signed it."

Renaud added that the meeting "was so closed it was confidential."

Diriker confirmed the decision to terminate the contract was mutual, but declined to comment further.

Steve Cohen, chairman of the comprehensive planning committee, said he was blindsided by the dissolution.

"We were not notified of the cancellation, and it was a complete surprise," he said, adding that the committee "did not know yet" how it would proceed next.

"I'm not sure yet, because I want to talk to Pat [Renaud] and see what they expect of us," Cohen said. "I think we can still do something."

# Pines certifies record 12 board candidates

Roughly half of dozen who filed new to OPA politics; forum scheduled June 22

(May 19, 2016) A record 12 candidates will compete for three seats on the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors this year.

Last week, the Gazette reported as many as a dozen had filed the paperwork to run for the OPA board. On May 12, the association confirmed all

12 had been certified.

Surprisingly, almost half of the announced candidates are political newcomers.

One current director, Jack Collins, will seek reelection. Another, Bill Cordwell, opted not to run while a third, Tom Terry, cannot run because of term limits.

Three members of Ocean Pines advisory boards are also running, including Budget and Finance Chair Pat Supik, Frank Daly from the Comprehensive Planning Committee and Doug Parks, from Bylaws & Resolu-

tions. Steve Lind formerly served on the Clubs committee.

Two others, Ray Unger and Slobodan Trendic, have run during the last two election cycles. Unger has previous experience on the board, while Trendic was the third-leading vote getter last year.

Five others, Brett C. Hill, Larry Perrone, George J. Simon Jr. Sharona Ezaoui, Tom Janasek, do not have experience on the board and are not current members of an advisory group.


The three candidates who receive the highest numbers of votes will be

elected for three-year terms.

Upcoming election dates include the candidate draw, determining the order each will appear on the ballot and during the OPA forum, on June 9 at 3 p.m. The forum will be held on June 22 at 6 p.m. in the community center.

Cutoff for voter eligibility is July 8 and ballots will be mailed on July 11.

All ballots must be received by Aug. 11. Votes will be counted on Aug. 12 and announced during that annual meeting, at 10 a.m. on Aug. 13, in the community center.

# Third strike against 'Little Library'

Free book drop box was hit three times by vandals; SH mayor seeks oversight help

(May 19, 2016) It's only been a month since Ellie Black's "Little Library" was installed at the playground at Byrd Park, but in that short time, vandals have damaged the book box three times, tearing off the door twice and smashing the glass at least once.

Each time, the town has repaired and reinforced it, and it will continue to do so, Mayor Charlie Dorman said.

"Of course, we're going to keep fixing it," he said. "And we'd like everyone's help watching over it."

Installed in April, Black's little library stands about four feet tall, is painted bright blue and has a shingled roof with a glass-paned door and a latch. Black, a fourth-grade student at Snow Hill Middle School, built the library on the weekends with her father, Brent Black, over a period of two months.

The idea came from a news report the fourth-grader saw describing the "Little Free Library" movement started in 2010. Black's project is unaffiliated with the larger program, but last week the town unveiled its own officially recognized Little Free Library at the Laundromat on Market Street. My'Jae Waters, a first-grader at Snow Hill Elementary School, was designated the "official librarian" of that effort.

Black, inspired by the news report, asked her father if she could build her own little library. At the time, she said, Byrd Park seemed like a perfect spot, since children are often on the playground, and wrote a letter to the mayor and Town Council asking permission to install the library once completed.

The council told Black they thought it was a great idea, and once it was finished, scheduled a date to install it.

That day came and passed in early April, and since then Black has come back twice to restock books and inspect damage.

"I don't think it's discouraging,"

she said about the repeated vandalism, "I just want to fix it."

Three sheets of Plexiglas, each about one-eighth of an inch thick now sit where a single pane of glass was once seated. The hinges have been reinforced, and a new latch on the door has been installed.

"We can't just let it keep happening — it might just be the newness of it. It's definitely not discouraging, hopefully, eventually everyone will see the value," Ellie's mother Donna Black said.

There have been talks about moving the library a little farther away from the playground to the town's Public Works building, about one-quarter of a mile west of the current location.

Ellie Black is not a fan of the idea. "If it moved, people doing this will just move over there and do it some more," she said.

Her solution is simple. "I think people should take the books and use it as it's supposed to be used. It's really hurting our community," she said. "If you're just going to keep breaking it — what's the point?"

# Solar power co-op for homeowners forming in county

(May 19, 2016) Recent conversations about solar power in the area have focused on mass scale, enterprise-level operations using acres and acres of land and both producing and selling gigawatt after gigawatt.

After a few meetings next month, a countywide effort may develop between homeowners throughout Worcester, each producing a piece of a larger puzzle that could significantly affect the way the county keeps the lights on.

The idea, as explained by Corey Ramsden, the Maryland program manager for the non-profit Community Power Network, is for residents to use their collective purchasing power to leverage a discount on installation fees for solar cells on their property.

"We're agnostic on the reasons for adopting solar power — if they're for environmental or independent causes," he said.

# Candidate Simon brings vast construction career to race

(May 19, 2016) George Simon Jr. he has "seen it all" during his decades-long career in construction, and he's hoping to bring that expertise to the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors in August.

"I've been in construction and construction sales pretty much my whole life," he said. "The main thing I can bring to the board is knowledge of construction, construction projects, sales and the bid process, and ... I have a good relationship with a lot of the contractors in the area."

Simon, a 55-year-old territory representative with TRI Supply & Equipment in Salisbury, is one of a dozen candidates vying for three positions on the board.

After growing up in Baltimore, he moved his family to the Ocean Pines area in 1986, and bought his first home there about four years later.

"We would come down here to the ocean on vacation and we liked the area, and when we had kids, we didn't want them growing up [in the Baltimore] area," Simon said. "Probably the best thing I ever did for my family was moving down here."

"All the kids have gone through the local school systems, and it's been a great experience living down here," he added. "Having kids, I haven't been as active in a lot of things as I'd like to be, but I've coached sports in Berlin on and off for 25 years and I've worked with kids in Ocean Pines, teaching basketball."

When considering a run for the board, Simon said he was troubled by some of the negative press the community often receives in the local media.

"I sit back and I read some of the newspapers - some of them are very negative," he said. "I'm sorry, but I enjoy where I live. If you read some of these newspapers they make it sound like people have the worst experience in their life living here. Ocean Pines is

a great place."

He said the amenities, for instance, are often taken for granted.

"We have a yacht club here that's fantastic," he said. "In the summertime we go there just about every weekend. Where else can you take your kids and sit and have that beautiful view and listen to music? It's an all-around good place for the whole family."

"We're somebody who has come to the area and enjoyed using the amenities - they're there for us," Simon added. "We have youth programs as part of the recreation [department] that we've always used, and we use the pools."

Simon called himself a "fiscal conservative." He pledged to be a positive influence on the board, and said his work background would help the association deal with some of the problems it does have, including addressing several aging structures.

"I think having another positive person on the board would help," he said. "The board has been doing very well, but they've been touched with some hot-button issues lately and I guess the next big issue will be the country club."

"With my past experiences in construction, I do say I generally lean more towards building new as opposed to rebuilding," Simon added. "Especially with structures that are older, what people don't understand is you're getting into something and a contractor may give you a bid for 'x' amount of dollars, but when then they tear the floors up and they tear the walls out and - wow, we're not even close. The next thing you know you're rebuilding structure and it's very close to something you could've done brand new."

A political newcomer, Simon said he's essentially running to help maintain the community that has supported his family for more than 25 years.

"I'm new to politics, but I just want to help out the community," he said. "That's really the bottom line. I love it here and I just felt it was time to give back."

# Electric savings from solar could total 30-70 percent

The rewards, Ramsden said, are tangible. Apart from an initial outlay for installation and equipment, a solar power system has many advantages.

“Whether or not a system is right for you usually depends on three things: the space available, how much power you use and your budget. But there are ways to spread the cost out, like financing options,” he said.

Before incentives, Ramsden said, a solar power system designed for home use can cost anywhere between \$9,000 and \$20,000 installed.

Grouping customers into a cooperative situation can bring that cost down. Ramsden said the federal government provides an incentive good for 30 percent of the installation cost as a tax credit — not deduction — on income taxes. Maryland, he continued, will kick in a \$1,000 grant if the home is a primary residence and is not within a historic district. The system will also generate “solar renewable energy credits” that can be used or sold individually or by a broker as electricity is generated, he said.

“If you were to buy a system outright, it would pay for itself in 8-10 years and these systems generally last 20 years,” Ramsden said. “In terms of offset, you should see a 30-70 percent reduction in your bill.”

A residence requires at least 200 feet of roof space to install a photovoltaic electric system, but those 200 feet all don't have to be in one place. Ground-based systems are possible, but require more space.

“We generally don't get into the ground systems,” he said. “We test to make sure your house gets enough sun. The hours between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. are the most important.”

These systems are not intended to outright replace existing home-based electrical service. One reason is that the generated power can't be stored, so it's filtered back into the grid to be used by the customer as credits. Secondly, it rains.

In order to gain the critical mass of interested parties, MD Sun — the program Ramsden manages, organizes meetings. The first meeting will be held at the Train Station, 200 Belt Street in Snow Hill on June 23

at 7 p.m., and the second session will be held at the Ocean Pines Library, located at 11107 Cathell Road, at 7 p.m. on June 29.

Ramsden said as few as 25 people can form a cooperative arrangement, as he has set up in both Salisbury and Easton.

Once a critical mass is reached, Ramsden said his organization would help develop the request for proposal, which is then sent to various vendors. The members of the cooperative would then choose the installer from the proposals based on whatever factors it decided were most advantageous — a local contractor, perhaps, or the vendor offering the best price.

Those decisions are farther down the road, Ramsden said.

“The process takes seven to 10 months based on the numbers and the location. It all starts with the 90-minute information sessions,” he said.

## Pocomoke Council meeting delayed; will resume next wk.

(May 19, 2016) The Pocomoke City Council, through City Manager/Attorney Ernie Crofoot, announced Monday morning that the regular meeting — scheduled for Monday evening — has been delayed until next week.

The meeting will be held Monday, May 23 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall instead.

The town is pursuing a Main Street community designation offered by the state, which has granted that status to other lower shore towns such as Berlin and Salisbury. However, to pursue the designation, the council must pass a resolution, an action that requires the town to

advertise its intentions.

Crofoot said the mayor and City Council had not been notified of the resolution requirement in time for this week's meeting, and moved back the meeting date as a result.

The Main Street Maryland program is competitive and selects communities that “have made a commitment to succeed and helps them improve the economy, appearance and image of their traditional downtown business districts,” according to the state's website for the program.

Main Street program participants get access to a number of resources such as training, education programs and information on funding programs.

# Pines Elections Committee: 'we have ... work cut out for us'

(May 19, 2016) The Ocean Pines Association Elections Committee has its hands full with the largest pool of board of director candidates in community history.

A day after the filing deadline, and when news leaked out that a dozen homeowners had done so, the committee went to work on the logistics of putting together election materials and a forum that would include a record number of candidates.

"We have our work cut out for us," committee Chairman Bill Wentworth said during a meeting on May 11. "We're going to have to be a little creative in how we do the normal forum. How we normally do it ... it would be over four or five hours. That would be like watching paint dry."

"We've never had this many people – never, ever," Wentworth added. "This is a new horizon for us."

Committee member Frank Danowski asked about the likelihood that some of the candidates would drop out of the race.

"It's very rare for a candidate to drop out," committee member Judy Butler said. "Usually if a candidate drops out, it's because of some kind of extraordinary happening, like a family emergency. Once they apply, most candidates go through with [it]. My guess is we've got 12."

The committee members changed

several of the dates related to the election that had been previously announced during public meetings. The candidate draw, which will determine the order both during the forum and on the ballots, will be held on June 9. The forum itself takes place on June 22 at 6 p.m. in the community center.

Final review of election materials will occur on June 29. Voter eligibility and final list of candidates is due July 8, ballots will be mailed on July 11, and a ballot box will be placed and phone monitoring by the committee will start on July 12.

Ballots must be received by Aug. 11 at 5 p.m., and votes will be counted on Aug. 12. The annual meeting, when the election results are announced, is Aug. 13.

The committee spent the majority of the meeting trying to anticipate technical and logistical issues that could arise during the forum, when a dozen candidates likely will be vying for the time and attention of Ocean Pines voters.

Last year, several candidates complained about confusion with regard to how much time each was allowed to speak. Others created problems by ignoring the rules and standing up and walking around the room while answering questions.

Committee members tentatively agreed to a format that would give each candidate three-minute opening remarks, three-minute closing remarks,

and for each to answer a pair of questions with a two-minute limit for response time per question.

If all goes well, that adds up to a 120-minute – or two-hour – forum. According to the YouTube video of the 2015 forum, that debate lasted two hours, one minute and 50 seconds.

"It's key to make sure that we have the technical problems [addressed]," Danowski said. "If the environment is constructed in the proper way, then the candidates will behave in a way that the environment dictates."

Umbrellas and rain boots at the ready, Danowski led the committee on a

quick fieldtrip to the Assateague Room inside the community center, where the committee considered using four large risers as a staging area for the forum, as well as video monitors that would give the audience a view of the questions.

Holding a second debate was briefly discussed, although no decisions were made and it was noted that the Parke hosts an informal candidate discussion after the official OPA forum.

Another committee meeting was set for May 26 at 9 a.m. to talk in more detail about a candidate workshop that would occur on the same date as the candidate draw.



Bohlen said the event included "a lot of good information, good sessions [and] fantastic speakers." The commission discussed the natural elements of the new Constitution Gardens park and playground in Gaithersburg.

Another subject that came up were the materials left behind by the DEW

Tour, apparently donated to the Town of Ocean City, that Berlin was interested in using for a skate park connected to Berlin Falls.

### Events recaps and previews

The commission discussed the May 7 "Just Walk" event, which Bohlen said about 20 people attended.

She said weather slightly dampened the first spring Just Walk, although those in attendance enjoyed the new longer route, which started at Worcester Youth and Family Counseling Services on Main Street. The next Just Walk will be held in November.

Summer Movie Nights start on June 18 with a screening of "Tuck Everlasting" in the downtown area.

Additional scheduled screenings include "The Wizard of Oz," July 2 at Stephen Decatur Park, "Finding Nemo," July 16 in William Henry Park, "The Princess Bride," July 30 in Stephen Decatur Park, "Goonies," Aug. 13 at Henry Park, and "Runaway Bride," Aug. 27 in downtown Berlin.

The program is a joint effort of the parks commission and the Berlin Arts & Entertainment Committee.

# Snow Hill raises amusement tax

### Hike comes in advance of proposed train; signals town prepping for growth

(May 19, 2016) To mirror what is charged in Pocomoke City, the Snow Hill Town Council voted to increase the amusement tax from two percent to five percent during last week's council meeting.

Despite not being a huge money-maker for the town, certain proposals — including an excursion train linking Snow Hill with Berlin that is still very much in the planning stages —

would have an effect on town finances eventually, Mayor Charlie Dorman said. Dorman said he wanted the town to be prepared should an amusement renaissance occur.

The amusement tax is collected via the state comptroller's office for Maryland's counties and Baltimore City, incorporated cities, towns and the Maryland Stadium Authority. The rate, according to the comptroller's office, is set by municipalities between one-half and 10 percent of gross receipts from use or rental of sports equipment, the sale of merchandise, refreshments or services at a nightclub or entertainment venue

and admissions.

According to state figures as of Sept. 1, 2015, this change ties Snow Hill with Pocomoke City for the highest percentage rate charged in the area. Ocean City charges three percent, as do the unincorporated county areas. Berlin now has the lowest rate, at two percent.

Worcester County rates are generally lower than in Wicomico, which charges professional baseball-related activities 10 percent, while most others are six percent. Movies in Salisbury are charged five percent in amusement tax, and "other activities" are charged four and one-half percent.

# Snow Hill write-in candidates limited

### Change in code occurred years prior; move basically brings charter up to date

(May 19, 2016) Balancing the need for free and open elections with an expense estimated to be between \$6,000-\$7,000 in advertising and equipment fees, the Snow Hill Council voted last week to amend the charter to revise the

time a person has to mount a write-in candidacy.

Mayor Charlie Dorman said the town's code had already been modified some time ago to change the declaration date to the end of March, but those changes never made it into the charter proper.

The new regulations impose a drop dead filing date of March 31, no matter the type of campaign a candidate intends to run. If an incumbent is unopposed following that deadline, the election will be

cancelled, as it was this year.

Previously, a write-in effort was allowed up until one week before the election, which brought significant costs — voting machines would need to be rented and judges would need to be assigned, among other expense factors.

Other municipalities in the area, Dorman said, had already made similar moves.

"Everyone has the right to file," Dorman said. "If there are two candidates, we're having an election."

# New Berlin Library plans nearly done; funds still needed

(May 19, 2016) Plans for the Berlin Library are proceeding, with the Worcester County Library Foundation estimating site plan work is about 95 percent finished.

That's according to foundation board member Ron Casio, who showed the latest schematics to the Berlin Planning Commission last week.

Developed by architect Jeff Schoelkopf, the two-story 11,400- square-foot building on Harrington Street adjacent to the Waystead Inn looks to improve on nearly every aspect of the current library on Main Street.

The eight-page architectural site plan shown to the commission included a much larger multipurpose space that can accommodate up to 100 people and provide space for plays, musical performances or meetings. In addition, the design features several outdoor enclaves that were meant to maximize the building's geographic location in relationship to the sun.

As for fundraising efforts, Casio admitted the foundation has hit a few snags.

When a portion of the \$1.9 million in funding promised by the county proved difficult to procure, the Humphreys Foundation jumped in with a \$150,000 matching grant, with the town of Berlin putting up \$75,000.

"That gave us \$225,000 that paid for

designs," Casio said. "The county bought the property, they paid some bills, but really we've gotten this far with private funds, which enabled us to begin. So, we really feel like we're ahead of the game."

Additional funding towards the construction could come from state grants.

Casio said the foundation already had about \$1 million in grants for fiscal year 2016 and were eligible for nearly the same amount during the next cycle.

"We suspect that we're only going to have the county pay for approximately half of the building," he said, although exactly

what that cost would be remains uncertain.

"We're hoping to, in the next couple months, know what the building is going to cost," Casio said. "The county commissioners asked us what it was going to cost a year ago and I stood up there and said, 'I'm not

going to lie to you, I don't have the plans.'  
"There was a ballpark," he added. "We were like 10,000 square feet and four-to-five [million]. But I never like to tell anyone how much it's going to cost until I have a set of plans. Now, we're going to know soon."

In part, those estimates were delayed because the planners have been taking their time in developing the concept of the library. In doing so, however, Casio said the foundation hopes this latest branch of the Worcester County Library will pay dividends over time by using smarter design techniques.

"What we've learned in overseeing the five libraries [in the county] is that the last two are costing the taxpayer a lot of money to own and operate," Casio said. "There's two costs to buildings: there's a cost to buy, and a cost to own and operate. The county has been procuring buildings as if they're only going to own them for 15-20 years. That's crazy. If they take care of [the new library], it could be there for 200 years."

"This whole process is in order to procure – for the county and the taxpayer – a building that they can afford to own and operate in a much better way than

we have been, and it has a lot to do with process. We're looking at the whole building as a system – how it reacts and inter-reacts with the other parts to reduce the overhead and the maintenance costs over time. That's the goal."

The foundation will hold two events to raise additional funds for the new library. On June 2, from 5-8 p.m., the "Ladies and Libations" beer and wine tasting at the West-O Bottle Shop will offer samples and light snacks. Tickets are \$30 in advance or \$35 at the door and are available by calling Jan Adamchak at 410-641-0950. Only 60 tickets will be sold.

On Sept. 16, the foundation will have a lawn party and silent auction at the Atlantic Hotel in Berlin. Tickets at \$35 will be available at the Berlin and Ocean Pines branches by June 15.

The library is also raising funds through an ongoing "brick" campaign, which allows for the purchase of engraved brick pavers that will be placed along the walkway to the new library.

Businesses or individuals who donate to the library can reserve designed areas, such as the local history collection or the children's reading section, which would be named in their honor.

# Thompson contract includes clause for 'new board' review

(May 19, 2016) Although OPA General Manager Bob Thompson recently signed a three-year contract extension, the August board of directors election could affect the length of his tenure.

According to Director Tom Herrick, the new agreement includes a clause for reevaluation by the newly elected board.

That language is as follows:

"The contract is agreed to with the full understanding that the make-up of the Board of OPA evolves every year and a 'New Board,' created in the twenty seventh/twenty eighth (27/28) month of the existing contract.

"The 'New Board' or Mr. Thompson, may chose to change their position on an extension of the old contract or development of a new contract. The 'New Board' and Mr. Thompson must notify each other, in writing, no later than the end of the twenty eighth (28) month (August 2016) of their intention to support or change their positions. If there is a change, and there is a failure to develop a new contract, it will be treated as a removal for convenience unless it is mutually agreed by both parties to continue negotiations."

"The recent agreement to extend the GM's contract 'as is' for an additional three years is contingent upon the approval of the 'New Board' and Mr. Thompson as well," Herrick wrote in an email on Tuesday. "Should make for a very interesting election year."



# Planning commission passes Habitat project

## Contingent approval sends building back to Berlin's Board of Zoning Appeals

(May 19, 2016) The Berlin Planning Commission took the long way around, but it did unanimously grant conditional site plan approval for a new Habitat for Humanity of Worcester County project last Wednesday at Town Hall.

Habitat's latest local endeavor, on 21 Jefferson Street next to Berlin Coffee House in the downtown area, would put two, two-story apartments over ground floor studio or shop spaces for artists.

The nonprofit would use the revenue from the downstairs retail spaces to support future projects.

Berlin's historic commission and Board Of Zoning Appeals had already approved the project. Some planning commission members, however, saw potential for improvement in the site plan and asked about the possibility of pushing the setbacks closer to the curb.

Commission member Pete Cosby said he was "thrilled" about the concept, but that the structure would do well to maximize the space by cutting out the planned parking spaces.

"Extend the building further down and round off the pointed end, and make it really an exceptional brick downtown building and bring it out to the street like all the others," he said. "To have it set back on Jefferson Street – what a waste of space. Let's make a building that works."

## Co. Commissioner Bertino hosts next town hall, May 21

(May 19, 2016) Worcester County Commissioner Chip Bertino will hold his next Town Meeting on Saturday, May 21, at 10 a.m. at the Ocean Pines branch library.

Commissioner Bertino will provide information on issues and developments occurring within the district and the county as well as answer questions with Commissioner President Jim Bunting.

Jonathan Cook, president of the Worcester County Board of Education, will be the guest speaker. The Worcester County Commissioners and the Board of Education have been working cooperatively on several education issues including the budget and the construction of a new Showell Elementary School.

The idea was well received by the Habitat contingent of Vice President Lauren Bunting, Executive Director Andrea Bowland and architect David D. Quillin, although Bunting said time was almost up on a provisional grant that required commission approval.

One commission member worried about the logic of putting "starving artists" in the buildings.

"You're putting starving artists in there [who are] trying to run a starving business and then pay for everybody starving here, but we need money and we've got to pay the rent," Newt Chandler said. "It really doesn't sound like there's a happy ending here."

"Well, they can't be starving. All the Habitat owners have to be employed," Bunting said.

Bowland said similar habitat models had been successful, but in larger, metropolitan areas.

Bunting, sensing that the commission liked the overall idea but wanted some minor tweaks to the project, asked if it could grant approval with the understanding that it would reapply later to the board of zoning appeals to change the setback.

"We're trying to meet the timeframes [of the grant]," she said. "We would be happy to go to BZA, we just want to know, if our study period is over and we're purchasing this property, that we have your blessing on the plan."

Cosby said the building had "the right idea," but that with some improvement it could tie the town together, comparing it to the Calvin B. Taylor Bank building on Main Street.

"I hear you. You're up against it. You're a nonprofit. I'm going to approve this thing as it is tonight if that's the way it goes, and hope that you'll listen to what I'm saying and do this right," he said. "I'm asking

you not to lose this opportunity to build ... a building that would make this town be what we say it is – the greatest small town.

"If you build this [as is] it's not the greatest. We've lost an opportunity to have a magnificent, flat iron building in this town," Cosby added.

An amended motion, which in-

cluded a condition that Habitat go back to the board of zoning appeals to seek a five-foot setback – and add a "large shade tree" on the corner of the property – passed 6-0.

"This is a very progressive commission," Quillin said.

"Please don't call me that," Chandler deadpanned.

# XO beanery and bites grand opening just two weeks away

## Pocomoke mayor's son will run shop solo; says he's giving back to hometown

(May 19, 2016) Without acknowledging his past, Taylor Morrison, 24, said he couldn't pave the path to his future.

"There are some not so pretty parts, but each piece happens for a reason. If not for the bad times, I couldn't have this now — that took me a while to understand," he said. "You can make it better if you want to."

Morrison is putting the finishing touches on XO beanery and bites, a one-man show of coffee, desserts and

light lunches he intends to open in two weeks in downtown Pocomoke.

The coffee is a custom blend offered by Rise Up coffee, which is based on the Eastern Shore with locations in St. Michaels, Easton and Salisbury. The food is all Morrison's.

"I went to UMES for hotel management and golf, where you have to take four years of cooking. I always ended up in the bake shop making breads, desserts and pastries," he said. "I moved away for a little while, to South Carolina to be a personal chef, and returned home in October."

He found the building he would turn into the XO beanery in December, and has been working to convert it ever since. Gone is the drywall hiding a deeply weathered exposed brick wall, gone is the commercial grade carpet to be replaced with new floors and gone is the closet-sized restroom, converted into an actual closet, and

replaced with more modern facilities.

"I'm not Starbucks, and I don't want to be. I'm not doing triple-foam etc. drinks, but I am making coffee, tea and espresso drinks," he said. Smoothies will also be available.

The food options all come from Morrison's imagination.

"You can get a croissant anywhere, but I'm doing a chocolate croissant with an éclair filing. We're going to have two or three options for lunch, but the only one I've settled on is a chicken salad with grapes and bacon served on banana bread," he said.

XO beanery and bites will serve locally owned Chesapeake Bay Farms ice cream.

The coffeehouse will also naturally have a performance space, but late-night open mic nights or jam sessions are still a ways off.

"I've been watching the traffic move around downtown, and while I'll reopen for events like Fourth Friday, the schedule is pretty much set," he said.

He plans to open between 6:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, from 7 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday and is closed on Sunday.

Then there's the name.

"XO is kisses and hugs. For me, I haven't had the easiest road. I made some dumb mistakes and I learned I had to learn to love better and let people love me better. XO is bigger than a coffee shop, it's much more than the face value of hugs and kisses," he said.

Morrison's past, according to public records, includes a series of traffic violations — some serious — including a DUI where he received probation before judgment in 2014 and a

fatal accident later the same year. Morrison pleaded guilty to negligent driving, reckless driving and failure to yield while other charges weren't pursued by the prosecutor in that case. He blames the accident on a medical condition that causes occasional minor seizures.

"Upon reflection of what I came out on the other side of — I can't picture a better way of giving back than to help my town and the community I grew up in," he said. "It's awesome for me to come back and do what I love — coffee and baking are my two favorite things."

# Brooklyn Baking Barons cooking up new cake slate

'Flights' part of future of downtown shop; storefront could evolve into full cafe

(May 19, 2016) Berlin's newest confectioners, the Brooklyn Baking Barons, hope to have their Main Street storefront open soon.

Chris Poeschl and Tony Lanuza had been making their famous whiskey cakes at Crack of Dawn Bakery on Old Ocean Boulevard after running out of room in their original location in New York City.

On Friday, both attended a ribbon-cutting ceremony for Tracy's Barber Shop in Berlin and could be seen laughing and mingling with the locals.

"We were in a small kitchen in Brooklyn in a restaurant in our neighborhood, and when we knew we were going to be in People Magazine this past December, we knew we needed to find some room," Poeschl said. "Tony's parents live in Ocean View, and they were able to connect us with Sean [Burke], who owns Crack of Dawn Bakery. We've been baking there ever since, and it's 10 times the size of our old kitchen."

sponse and reception by the people of Berlin led the couple to look into setting up a permanent retail space.

"We knew that we had to get our own place, so we got a place right on 16 Main Street," he said. "Our goal is to be open by Memorial Day weekend. We're going to leave [the ribbon cutting] and go paint."

Last week, the Barons unveiled their latest creation, a Limoncello poppy seed cake. They also recently developed a "churro" cake, which is a cross between the fried dough Mexican pastry and a traditional rum cake.

"It's off the hook," Lanuza said of the latter, adding that the goal was to develop enough signature dishes to do "cake flights" similar to the beer flight samplers made popular at craft breweries.

"We are so excited to be able to explore a new aspect of what our business can be," Poeschl said. "Ever since we've been here we've gotten such a warm welcome from the community and surrounding area, and opportunities have sprung from that. We have new things coming into our inbox every day."

That includes being booked for a monthly cooking spot on local television program "Delmarva Life."

As for the storefront, Poeschl said

the sky is the limit.

"We're going to have new cakes, new products as we go forward, and we may end up being a full-fledged cafe," he said. "We have lots of ideas,

but right now we just need a place where people can come see us instead of just ordering on our website. We want to connect with the community."

# Pines Public Works sets bulk pickup

Free service will be held on Saturday, May 21; all items must be on curb by 6 a.m.

Regular household garbage and yard waste is not part of this collection. Instead, yard waste may be brought to the Ocean Pines Public Works yard, which will be open to Ocean Pines homeowners and residents during the month of May from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Saturdays.

All items for pickup should be placed by the curb no later than 6 a.m. Public Works will not enter private property to pick up materials. Items placed for pickup at any time other than the designated day will not be collected.

Republic Services customers are reminded that they may place up to

four bags of leaves or yard debris curbside for each scheduled pickup. This is in addition to regular trash pickup. Trash collection days for residents south of Route 90 are Tuesday and Friday. For residents north of Route 90, the collection days are Monday and Thursday.



Ellie, however, is a step ahead of most people, young or old, because she has vowed to respond in the only way that makes sense for her library and life in general: shrug off the meanness and continue to make repairs as needed.



That spending supported 1,320 jobs in the local area and had a cumulative benefit to the local economy of \$109,970,500.

“Assateague Island National Seashore welcomes visitors from across the country and around the world,” said Superintendent Debbie Darden. “We are delighted to share the story of this place and the experiences it provides. We also feature the park as a way to introduce our visitors to this part of the country and all that it offers. National park tourism is a significant driver in the national economy, returning \$10 for every \$1 invested in the National Park Service, and it’s a big factor in our local economy as well. We appreciate the partnership and support of our neighbors and are glad to be able to give back by helping to sustain local communities.”

The peer-reviewed visitor spending analysis was conducted by economists Catherine Cullinane Thomas of the U.S. Geological Survey and Lynne Koontz of the National Park Service. The report shows \$16.9 billion of direct spending by 307.2 million park visitors in communities within 60 miles of a national park.

This spending supported 295,000 jobs nationally; 252,000 of those jobs are found in these gateway communities. The cumulative benefit to the U.S. economy was \$32 billion.

According to the 2015 report, most park visitor spending was for lodging (31.1 percent) followed by food and beverages (20.2 percent), gas and oil (11.8 percent), admissions and fees (10.2 percent) and souvenirs and other expenses (9.8 percent).

Report authors this year produced an interactive tool. Users can explore current year visitor spending, jobs, labor income, value added, and output effects by sector for national, state and local economies. Users can also view year-by-year trend data. The interactive tool and report are available at the NPS Social Science Program webpage, [go.nps.gov/vse](http://go.nps.gov/vse).

The report includes information for visitor spending at individual parks and by state.

## Coffee, cheese, more coffee essential

For the love of all that's holy, someone get me a cup of coffee. Nay, bring me a tankard – a thermos of joe. Just load me up with one of those one-gallon carafes and I'll be on my way.

My body is buzzing, and I can't figure out why I'm coming unraveled. I'm supposed to be catching up on rest and

relaxation now that the semester is over, but somehow it's getting worse.

My elbows ache, I blew out my bicep muscle and somehow I managed to crease my little toe yesterday at work to a point where it hurts to walk. What in Hades is happening to me? It's almost as though this aging thing is real, but I refuse to accept that. It must be something else.

I remember as a teenager telling my parents that I would never grow old, and they would laugh. My invincibility was a silly notion to them as they were once invincible in their own rights, although when they themselves were invincible, films were still in black and white and World War I was a thing of the not-so-distant past. There are days when a glass of cold milk or a chunk of cheese seems to do the body and soul right.

Having a chunk of Pierre Robert cheese, a delightful French triple-cream cheese with a rind that is reminiscent of St. Andre, I threw together a small plate of goodies with the help of the folks at Liquid

Assets so I could flop on my couch, eat, relax and unwind. Since it was late at night, I imagine it was a good thing that I didn't eat a large meal.

Either way, I woke up better for the wear. Now that my first cup of coffee is gone, it's time to make another and to get the next 14-hour day started. I'm just glad that I was able to grab a chunk of good cheese last night. Just as glad as I am to have this coffee. Ah, the simple things in life.

### Cheese Plate

*Enough for one late night snack*

3 oz. Pierre Robert cheese  
Red grapes, as needed  
Crispy toast points, as needed  
2 Tbsp. Dried fruit compote (recipe follows)

1/4 Pear and apple, sliced

Work a very long day

Next, simply arrange everything on a plate, sit down in front of a terrible 80s movie, and enjoy

### Dried Fruit Compote

*Makes about 1 pint*

1/2 cup Dried apricots

1/2 cup Dried cherries  
1/2 cup Golden raisins  
1 Tbsp. Whole mustard seed  
3 Tbsp. Sherry vinegar  
2 Tbsp. Apple cider sugar, to taste

Combine all ingredients in a saucepan, cutting the cherries if you want everything to be of uniform size

Bring to a simmer and remove from heat, allowing the fruit to steep in the liquid until soft and the flavors have a chance to marry. Add more vinegar/cider as needed to ensure that the fruit has a chance to absorb the flavor

Chill and set aside until ready to use. This goes great with cheese plates, grilled chicken, pork and other items where a sharp, sweet and tart accompaniment would benefit the dish


